What is World AIDS Day?

“Our efforts have helped set the stage for a historic opportunity, one that the world has today: to change the course of this pandemic and usher in an AIDS-free generation.”

[World AIDS Day](#) is observed on December 1st each year and is an opportunity for people worldwide to unite in the fight against HIV, show their support for people living with HIV and to commemorate people who have died. World AIDS Day was the first ever global health day and the first one was held in 1988. The United States Government 2012 theme for World AIDS Day is “Working Together for an AIDS-Free Generation.”

Nearly one in five people in the United States who are HIV positive do not know it. You can take part in changing that by sharing messages on World AIDS Day and throughout the month of November. We want you to get involved in sharing information about HIV/AIDS in your community. It’s easy to take action with social media; you can take action by writing a blog, tweet, or Facebook post.

Secretary of State Hillary Clinton spoke these words in November 2011, marking a turning point in the HIV/AIDS epidemic since the first cases of AIDS were discovered more than 30 years ago. According to PEPFAR, an [AIDS-free generation](#) “entails that first, no one will be born with the virus; second, that as people get older, they will be at a far lower risk of becoming infected than they are today; and third, that if they do acquire HIV, they will get treatment that keeps them healthy and prevents them from transmitting the virus to others.”

An AIDS-free generation can be achieved globally and here in the United States. In July 2010, the White House released the first-ever comprehensive United States [National HIV/AIDS Strategy](#) (NHAS), a comprehensive coordinated HIV/AIDS roadmap with clear and measurable targets to be achieved by 2015.

What are some statistics about HIV/AIDS?

In the United States*:

- More than one million people are living with HIV in the U.S.
- One in five living with HIV is unaware of their infection.
- Men who have sex with men (MSM), particularly young, black MSM, are the most severely affected by HIV.
- By race, African Americans face the most severe HIV burden.

Worldwide**:


- 33.4 million are currently living with HIV/AIDS.
- More than 25 million people have died of AIDS worldwide since the first cases were reported in 1981.
- In 2008, 2 million people died due to HIV/AIDS, and another 2.7 million were newly infected.
- According to the World Health Organization (WHO), most people living with HIV or at risk for HIV do not have access to prevention, care, and treatment, and there is still no cure.


